The Keims are entitled to display a coat-of-arms, the motto of the family being: *Deo non fortuna.* 

Ludwig Hericourt Keim, believed to have been the first ancestor of record, was born about 1598, near Speier, in the Palatinate of the Rhine, and was an officer in the Thirty Years' War. He died after 1662. His son, George Keim, was born about 1623. His son Johann Keim, is supposed to have been born about 1647. His son, Johann Keim, was born about 1675, near Speier, and became the founder of the American branch of the family.

He was born near Speier, in the Palatinate of the Rhine, and became the founder of the American branch of the family. He is said to have come to America in 1698 or 1699, and to have returned to the Fatherland where he spent several years, embarking a second time for Pennsylvania about 1707, or a little earlier. He settled in the upper part of Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, which, in 1752, was absorbed in Berks County.

Among the articles which he brought with him from Germany was an antique chest having on its lid the portraits of two stately personages in ruffs and bearing the legend: "Ludwig Hericourt and Bertha Keim Landshaffen von Elsass. A D. MDCLX." Another heirloom, still more ancient, was a steel bow-gun upon which was inscribed: "Gilbert de Keim, A. D. 1314." This weapon, dating from the time of William Tell, was still in the possession of the Keim family into the twentieth century.

During his early manhood he remained near the homestead, engaging in agricultural pursuits. In 1755 he became one of the founders of Reading, the county seat of Berks County, Pennsylvania, where he bought real estate and established himself in the hardware business, being the originator of that line of trade in that region. During the Revolutionary War his sympathies and practical support were given to the cause of the colonists, and we find his name in a list of members of a company of "Associators."

He was born in Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, and was a child when the family removed to Reading, where the remainder of his life was passed. During the Revolutionary War he first became one of a company of Associators and later served in the Berks County militia with the rank of captain. During the winter at Valley Forge Captain Keim, out of his ample means, contributed largely to the relief of the suffering patriots and made several visits to the camp, meeting General Washington and the officers and men.

Mr. Keim was a recognized leader in the civic, commercial and moral progress of his community, filling at different times the offices of county commissioner and burgess of Reading. True to his German lineage he was a great lover of music, and purchased from an importer in Philadelphia one of the pianos of that early period. For a long time it was the only instrument of the kind in Reading and was, as may be supposed, an object of great curiosity. Not only did Mr. Keim possess a fondness for music, but he was essentially a student, familiar with the ethical writings of England, Germany and France.

John married **Susanna de Benneville**, daughter of **Dr. George de Benneville** and **Esther Bertolet**, on 15 Oct 1771. Susanna was born on 15 May 1748 and died on 15 Jan 1837 at age 88.

He was for years one of the wealthiest and most influential residents of his native Reading, Pennsylvania. He was one of the firm of Keim, Whitaker & Company, which founded, in 1835, the extensive iron works, one of the earliest and most important of the metal industries of that region. From 1824 to 1842 Mr. Keim was an officer of the Farmers' Bank, either president or cashier, and was also president of the Reading Water Company. In 1825 he served on the building committee which supervised the erection of Christ Church, and for many years he was a vestryman of the parish. Mr. Keim was also a liberal contributor to the First Universalist Church in Reading, his maternal grandfather, George de Benneville, having been the founder of that denomination in America. In the sphere of politics Mr. Keim departed from the family traditions which were chiefly Democratic, warmly advocating the principles of the Whigs. In 1858, 1859 and 1860 he was elected mayor of Reading. Mr. Keim was one of the original trustees of the Charles Evans Cemetery, having been appointed to that office by Mr. Evans in his will.

He and his wife were the parents of eleven children, of whom several died in infancy. Only four of the survivors married and left children.

Benneville married **Mary Hoch**, daughter of **Isaac Hoch** and **Sarah Hottenstein**,. Mary was born on 16 Jun 1792 and died on 14 Jul 1833 at age 41. Another name for Mary was Mary High. The surname "Hoch" is often given as "High," the latter being a translation of the former.

For many years he was associated in mercantile pursuits with his brother, William High Keim, they having succeeded their father. No other establishment in Reading, or in that part of Pennsylvania transacted a larger or more varied business than the house of W. H. and J. H. Keim. The latter member of the firm was also heavily interested in industrial enterprises in the Schuylkill and Lehigh valleys. In 1855 Mr. Keim removed with his family to Dubuque, Iowa, where he became cashier and partner in the banking house of F. S. Jessup & Company, afterward Redmond, Lovell & Company. Like many of his kinsmen, Mr. Keim was identified with the Pennsylvania militia, being at one time lieutenant-colonel of the Fifty-third Regiment. He was also affiliated with the Masonic fraternity and was a prominent Knight Templar.

John married **Martha Elizabeth Randolph**, daughter of **Gen. Thomas Beverley Randolph** and **Maria Barbara Mayer**, on 3 Sep 1839. Martha was born on 6 Apr 1818 and died on 5 Jun 1890 at age 72.

Gen. Thomas Beverley Randolph was a representative of one of the oldest and most distinguished families of Virginia and traced his descent from the Indian princess, Pocahontas, who became the wife of John Rolfe.
